# Could and Might Worksheets 1

**Could** is used to **express possibility**.



Mary **could** read without glasses when she was younger.  
Mary **could** not put the book down.

**Could** is used to **make a request**. It is always in the question form.

Mary speaks softly. So I ask her, “**Could** you repeat that please?”

**Could** is used to **make a suggestion**. It is only used in the affirmative.

What do you suggest Mary reads now?  
She **could** read “Through the Looking Glass“?

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**Might** is used to express a **possibility in the present or future**.



It **might** rain later.

You can also use: can, could, but, may and might are more common for possibilities.

Mary **might** not finish reading the book later.

**Might** is used also as a **possibility in the past**. However, it is followed by: **have done**.

Mary **might** have fallen asleep before she reached the end of the chapter.

Mary **might** have visited you, if she was not engrossed in her reading.  
Mary **could have** visited you, if you were home.
